

# Global Citizen Patch Program

To earn the patch a girl must complete four of the activities listed below for her age level.

<b>1. ON THE MAP</b>	Study a world map. Locate ten countries that have been in the news recently.	Use a globe or atlas and have each girl in the troop identify a country. At the next meeting have each girl present a few facts about that country (e.g. the climate, the population, the customs)	Have each girl identify a country and report to the troop on the country's topography, history, industry, population and culture including language(s), religion(s) and political and social customs.
<b>2. LAWS &amp; LEADERSHIP</b>	All countries have laws or rules. List the "rules" for your Brownie troop. Discuss how the rules were set and why they are important.	At your next troop meeting hold a "United Nations" meeting. Pick an issue (e.g. school uniforms, pollution) that affects your groups and discuss each of the girls' views. As a troop decide what you would do about the issues.	Observe leadership in action by visiting meetings of at least two groups (e.g. Community Board, volunteer group, or the City Council). Find out how the group operates, the rule of the members & the process they follow. Note how a productive meeting is held.
<b>3. CULTURE</b>	Many books have been written about people from different countries. Visit a library to get a book about people who live in another country. Read the story or have someone read it to you.	Choose a country and find out what a typical day would be like for a person from that country. What conditions would they live in? What would his or her future hold?	Either research at the library or on the internet the treatment of women and children in another country. What type of schooling do they receive? What rights do they have? What jobs can the women have?
