DISCOVER

- Use plant fibers to make a piece of cordage. Tie a knot in the end to make a bracelet.
- Discover the type of instruments American Indians used to make music. What are the items made from?
- Find the half hour glass in the steering room on the Elizabeth II. How did they use this object to keep time?
- Where did they cook on the ship? Can you find out what type of food they ate on board?
- Identify the use of a square knot and a bowline. Where on the ship did you find these knots?
- Explore the two tents. How are they different? Can you tell the difference between the types of people that live in each tent?

CONNECT

- What three major crops did American Indians grow? What do they call these three crops?
- Try and learn the sounds made by local birds and animals in the watch house. Can your troop remember three different bird calls?
- Visit the blacksmith shop. What type of tools did blacksmith create? Watch the blacksmith make a wrought nail. What makes these nails so special and work so well?
- Find out how the crew would raise the anchor, and lift heavy cargo. What type of simple machine is this? How did the crew work as a team?
- Explore and try the different tools in the Settlement Site. Are any of these tools still used today?
- Learn Algonquian words in the Leader's House. When you visit the ship and settlement see if you can learn some early modern English phrases.
- Try on the English and American Indian clothes in the museum. Do you think clothing would have been a main difference between these cultures? Why?

TAKE ACTION

- Girl Scouts help others learn how to weave basket patterns with construction paper or basket weaving materials
- Girl Scouts learn a decorative knot and come to the ship to teach others how to tie it and take it home
- Create a booklet describing Festival Park and hand it out to those in your community to encourage them to visit.
- Plant your own Three Sister's Garden and donate the crop to the local food bank.
- Participate in an Elizabeth II Crew weekend (only appropriate for Girl Scout Seniors and Ambassadors).
