DISCOVER

- Pick up a visitor guide on your way into the Museum. Read the general information page.
 - What year was the Museum built?
 - Where was Walter P. Chrysler, Jr. born?
 - What year did the Museum begin offering free admission?
- Walk outside and turn either left or right. How many gardens does the Museum have? What are they called?
- Visit the Perry Glass Studio across the street from the Museum. There is a touch station on display highlighting different glass techniques. Touch a few them, write down your three favorite.
- Find the Museum Shop. In the Museum shop we carry many items that relate to our art collection. Look through the post-cards, write down the artist and the title and see if you can find that work in Museum.
- The Museum usually hosts many exhibitions a year. Are there any temporary exhibitions in the Museum that you can find? What is the title of the show? What is it about?

CONNECT

- Visit the Egyptian Gallery & watch the video about Psamtik-Seneb. What is inscribed on the sarcophagus?
- Find a Gallery Host in one of the galleries. Ask them to show you what their iPad can do! Describe what they showed you below.
- Read the label of the large sculpture outside in front of the Museum. Do we have any other works of art by this artist?
- In the Glass Galleries find the cameo plates created by Thomas & George Woodall (look in the far left corner or as a Gallery Host for help). After reading the label, answer the questions below.
 - What two colors of glass are used to make the Woodall plates?
 - Which plate was created first?
 - Can you find anything else in the gallery created by the Woodall brothers? If so, what did you find?
- Find the largest painting in the collection. What does it depict?

TAKE ACTION

- Museums exist to serve their communities. At the Chrysler Museum we host many events such as Third Thursday, Family Day, and art making demonstrations. Sometimes we may show a film, bring in a special guest speaker, or lead an art making workshop. What kind of special event would appeal to community members like you? Plan an event at the Museum and write down a schedule of events for that day.
- Create a flyer about the Chrysler Museum of Art. Pick out the best aspects of the Museum that you think would appeal to your friends. Present it to your Girl Scout Troop.
