DISCOVER

- Look at a state map and find Elizabeth City. Where is it located? What sound is connected to the Pasquotank River? How many square miles is Elizabeth City?
- Research when the movement to separate Camden County from Elizabeth City was made. During the American civil war, was Elizabeth City controlled by the union or confederacy?
- Go to <u>www.Carolana.com/NC/Towns/Elizabeth City NC.html</u> and answer these questions
 - When was Elizabeth City First Baptist Church organized?
 - When was the court house completely finished?
 - In what year was the Elizabeth City Academy chartered?
- How does the Pasquotank River help our ecosystem? What makes it unique?
- What are the main crops grown in Pasquotank county? How much land in Elizabeth City is dedicated to agriculture?

CONNECT

- Visit Arts of the Albemarle in downtown Elizabeth City and review some of the local art pieces. When you're finished, discuss your favorite one. Then go and find out more about it.
- Take a trip to visit Meads Pool. Find out when it first opened and why it is unique compared to other pools.
- Fun Junction was established as a landfill for Pasquotank County. The idea came to turn it into an industrial park. Plan a trip to Fun Junction. Learn about how it is eco-friendly. While you are there, participate in one of the activities offered such as the skate park, walking trails, etc.
- Explore the ECSU Planetarium and contact them to sign up for a laser/star show.
- Visit Dixieland Speedway, and watch one of the races. Learn more about the sport and how to run the races.
- Visit the Museum of the Albemarle to learn the history of the Albemarle area. Make sure to visit a historic cemetery behind the museum to see the tombs of the unknown soldiers.
- Visit the local American Red Cross. Find out the services they offer among their community and how much area of land they cover in their region. Find out what it takes to become a volunteer and the training involved.

TAKE ACTION
