Juliette Gordon Low is part of the American Women Quarters™ Program



Get ready to celebrate because history is in the making! Our very own trailblazer, Juliette Gordon Low, is among the five women being honored in 2025 by the <u>United States Mint</u>. The official release of Juliette's quarter will take place in late March, which is Women's History Month. A special reception recognizing the historical significance will be held on March 26 at the Smithsonian's Women's History Museum. Collector sets will be available for purchase from the Mint.

According to the United States Mint: "The American Women Quarters[™] Program is a four-year program that celebrates the accomplishments and contributions made by women of the United States. Beginning in 2022, and continuing through 2025, the U.S. Mint is issuing up to five new reverse designs each year." These quarters pay tribute to women from diverse backgrounds who have made their mark on suffrage, civil rights, abolition, government, humanities, science, space, the arts, and more. It's a powerful recognition of the incredible impact women have had on our nation's history. The

trailblazers who've graced these quarters to date: Maya Angelou, Bessie Coleman, Celia Cruz, and Eleanor Roosevelt are just a few examples. Now, Juliette Gordon Low is joining their esteemed company, and we couldn't be prouder.

The selection of Juliette Gordon Low for this prestigious honor on the national stage serves as a powerful reminder that her visionary spirit and the Movement she founded are beacons of hope for every girl. And today, the world needs Girl Scouts more than ever. Low's legacy comes to life in every Girl Scout and alum who speaks up for what they believe in, leaves the world better than they found it, and blazes a trail of their very own.

Let's dive into the design elements and their significance on the new quarter featuring Juliette Gordon Low. The design captures Juliette's spirit and strength. Juliette is rocking her 1920s Girl Scout uniform, complete with trefoils on her hat, lapels, belt buckle, and pin. Check out the Thanks Badge over her heart—it's the highest adult award in Girl Scouting! And that Silver Fish around her neck? It's the top honor in UK Girl Guiding, symbolizing swimming upstream and overcoming obstacles. This quarter design is packed with history and Girl Scout pride.

The unveiling of the Juliette Gordon Low quarter design marks a monumental milestone not only for Girl Scouts but for everyone. Alum Spotlight: Honoring Nellie Hayse



Lifetime Girl Scout and former Girl Scouts of the Colonial Coast Chief Executive Officer Nellie Hayse passed away on December 14, 2024.

As a girl, Nellie received the highest award one could earn in Girl Scouts at the time, the Curved Bar, and she received the highest national Girl Scout award as an adult, the Thanks Badge. In addition, she was presented the highest Council award for an adult, the Dorothy Barber Lifetime Achievement Award.

Nellie's work as a professional was also recognized by the community, earning the Virginia Volunteer Administrator Award in 2001 and the Hampton Roads Woman of the Year award in 2002.

Nellie believed strongly in paying it forward and in helping girls and women become empowered. There were many lives Nellie touched, including countless staff and volunteers she mentored.

"This is a great loss to Girl Scouts and the Hampton Roads community," said Colonial Coast CEO Tracy Keller, who was mentored by Nellie and took her place when Nellie retired. "Nellie found her passion early in life, helping others and making a difference in the lives of girls and women. That legacy will continue through the work of all she touched."

TAX DAY: Make a Difference for Girls!

Do you want to reduce your taxes? There's plenty of time to plan your charitable contributions deduction for next year's tax season. Girl Scouts of the Colonial Coast is an IRS qualified organization, #54-1158412, and we can help. Here are some different ways to reduce your tax liability.

Monthly Donation: Determine the total amount that will help you reduce your taxes and divide it by the remaining months of the year. GSCCC's <u>easy monthly donation</u> <u>system</u> can help you with automatic payments. *For example:* \$4,500 (estimate needed to reduce your tax liability) / 9 months remaining in 2025 = \$500 monthly donation

Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD): If you're 70 ½ or over, you can transfer your GSCCC donation tax-free each year from your Individual Retirement Account. A married couple, if both spouses are age 70 ½ or over, have a limit of \$100,000 per year. Ask the company that holds your IRA for their assistance since it must come directly from them to GSCCC.

GSCCC is with you every step of the way, and your impact stays here in our local Girl Scout Council. You are an important part of Girl Scouts' mission of serving girls well into the future, and you have the power to make a big difference.
