

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Javaune Adams-Gaston, Ph.D. *President of Norfolk State University*



As the seventh president of Norfolk State University (NSU), Javaune is committed to ensuring that NSU fulfills its mission and to ensuring the success of each student. Her vision is opportunity, access, affordability, growth, sustainability, and student excellence. A strong advocate for collaboration and developing strategic partnerships with stakeholders, Javaune cultivates strong connections among NSU

alum and within the community. Under her leadership, NSU has achieved the status of a U.S. News and World Report Top Historically Black Colleges and Universities designation. Enrollment has steadily increased and the University realized record high operating revenues.

In addition, with her drive to improve, NSU expanded its online academic program curriculum to include a master's degree in Cybersecurity and has been recognized nationally. Under her leadership, the online master's degree in Cyber Psychology, the first in the nation, launched in 2020.

A recognized higher education leader, with a Ph.D. in psychology from Iowa State University, she is regularly invited as a speaker nationally and internationally. Her appointments and honors have included: President Biden's Appointment to the Board of Advisors on Historically Black Colleges and Universities, U.S. Department of Commerce Industrial Advisory Committee, NCAA Board of Governors, Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges Board of Trustees, and Greater Norfolk Corporation Board of Directors.

As a leader, she believes that the more we give our time or resources to the issues we care about, the more others will give in return.

Tonya Byrd Senior Policy Director (Community Engagement) at Dominion Energy



Whether at work or in her spare time, Tonya has a strong focus on STEM education, volunteerism, and community engagement. This Girl Scout alum is a native of Hampton, Virginia, and a graduate of Hampton High School. She earned her bachelor's degree in Mechanical Engineering from Howard University and a M.B.A. from George Washington University. With over 30 years at Dominion Energy,

she currently leads Community Engagement efforts across the company's footprint. Prior positions include: engineer and senior nuclear training instructor at Surry Power Plant, supervisor of customer account management in Norfolk, and supervisor of electrical distribution design across the Hampton Roads Peninsula.

In 2008, Tonya was selected as a fellow for the Summer Institute for Nuclear Professionals at the University of Ottawa, Ontario, Canada. In 2012, she was featured in Black Engineering Magazine in an article titled, "Notable Blacks in Energy: They've Got the Power." Tonya serves on many boards and is an active volunteer. Those boards include: Cheryl Jackson Tyler Foundation, Inc., Fort Monroe Foundation, and Tidewater Community College Educational Foundation. For her volunteerism and community activism, she was honored in 2019 as Volunteer of the Year (Community Vitality) by Dominion Energy. Tonya exemplifies the principles of the Girl Scout Promise and Law through her dedication to helping others and sharing her mentorship and leadership to make the world a better place!

Girl Scout Famous Former Honoree

Sierrah Chavis Director Youth Opportunities at United Way South Hampton Roads; Founder/CEO of Bossy Girl



A dynamic educator and non-profit leader, Sierrah has been a passionate advocate for youth, especially those in underserved areas, for many years. With a deep commitment to inclusivity and equity, she started her journey earning a Master's of Education degree and later an Educational Specialist Degree in School Leadership and Administration.

Beyond her work at United Way, she is an author of impactful books that include, "No Shame in My Pain" and "From Pain to Power," along with a children's book titled, "Dance of Colors: Caribbean Rhythms and Family Traditions." Her writing extends to educational publications, blogs, and articles, further amplifying her advocacy interests. Sierrah is also the founder of Bossy Girl Inc., an organization dedicated to empowering girls and women and preparing the next generation of female leaders, CEOs and entrepreneurs.

Awards and recognitions for her advocacy include: the Diversity Champion Award from Old Dominion University, the Impact Leadership Award from the Virginia Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development, and Teacher of the Year from Virginia Council for Learning Disabilities.

CDR Heidi Koski Commanding Officer of U.S. Coast Guard Base, Elizabeth City



Originally from Mocksville, North Carolina, this Girl Scout alum now calls Chesapeake, Virginia home. Her journey to become a Commanding Officer with the U.S. Coast Guard began when she graduated from the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in 2004 where she earned a Bachelor's of Science in Mechanical Engineering.

Upon receiving her commission as an officer, she reported to the CGC Vigilant in Cape Canaveral, Florida, as Student Engineer. Two years later, she reported to Naval Engineering Support Unit in Portsmouth, Virginia, where she served as Port Engineer. She then attended the University of Maryland where she earned her Master's of Science in Reliability Engineering. Her career journey included serving as Patrol Boat Systems Manager, Surface Forces Logistics Center Patrol Board Product Line Programmed Depot Maintenance Branch Chief and an assignment to Strategic Resource Branch, Coast Guard Atlantic Area responsible for budget planning and capability initiatives.

She believes leaders are individuals who guide or direct in a course by showing the way. Coast Guard senior leadership should possess the highest standards of professionalism and personal integrity and these are exemplified in their adherence to the Coast Guard's core values of honor, respect, and devotion to duty.

Heidi has been recognized with two Meritorious Service Medals, two Coast Guard Commendation medals, the 2016 Captain Stratton Leadership award, and several other personal and unit awards.

Wendy Scott, Ph.D.

Founder and Director of Tidewater Collegiate
Academy at Virginia Wesleyan University



Wendy is the founder and director of the Tidewater Collegiate Academy, located at Virginia Wesleyan University. The school is an innovative homeschool serving a diverse group of PK-12th grade students. The curriculum, developed by Wendy, facilitates the development of global citizens and equips them with 21st century skills — preparing them to make the world a better place.

She has spent years as an educator learning how to help each individual student uncover their potential so they can realize their role and value as a global citizen. Before going to school full time to earn her Ph.D. from ODU, Wendy taught secondary, social science courses in public school for 10 years. She was named Brooke Point High School, Stafford County Teacher of the Year in 2005, Chesapeake Public Schools Teacher of the Year City-Finalist in 2009, Great Bridge Ruritans' Teacher of the Year in 2013, and Virginia Historical Society Teacher of the Year in 2017.

Today, she combines educational psychology, the cognitive sciences, research-based best practices, and practical experience to help families develop effective experiences. She believes that every young person was made for a purpose, and they deserve the opportunity to cultivate their strengths and gifts in a safe and caring environment so that they will be equipped to make their contribution in the world.

Did you know...?

Alums are more likely than other women to volunteer (48% compared to 33%) and contribute financially to causes they care about (62% compared to 47%).
